INQUIRERS

What are my interests and strengths? What is a problem that I can solve with a product or service, or is there a current solution that I can improve upon? What is the market for my product? Through self-exploration and market research, our 7th grade Design students found an intersection between their own passions and a "problem" they felt existed in order to start their own businesses. Our student entrepreneurs continued to inquire as they applied graphic design elements, marketing strategies, principles of finance and ethics in developing a Social/Sustainability Initiative on their way to making a pitch. The experience culminated in a shark tank presentation in front of judges.






















KNOWLEDGEABLE

We develop and use conceptual understanding, exploring knowledge across a range of disciplines. We engage with issues and ideas that have local and global significance.

Eighth grade Individuals and Societies students exemplified knowledgeable traits while **creating their own colony** on a fictitious planet called Nisi. Students had learned about the colonization of North



America previously, and this gave them a chance to apply what they learned in their own unique way. Students used a packet to plan their colony, and each had to include information about why they were leaving Earth. The reason they were leaving needed to be a current issue, but also was to mirror a reason that Europeans left for North America. In addition, students had to think through the type of colony they would settle, where they would settle on a planet similar to Earth, the type of government they would have, and the type of economy that would work best in the geography of their colony. Each student chose a different medium in which to display their knowledge, and final products included slideshow presentations aimed at attracting colonists, tourism brochures showcasing their colony's beauty and success, and videos showing the many features and strengths of the colony.



THINKERS

We use critical and creative thinking skills to analyze and take responsible action on complex problems. We exercise initiative in making reasoned, ethical decisions.


7th grade pre-algebra students engaged as thinkers in their **spring architecture project**. An outdoor space at LCA was offered as the "blank slate" from which students could propose development plans. Early in the project, students measured the space and agreed upon a scale for their sketches. Everything had to be drawn to scale, and geometric attributes such as perimeter, area and volume were calculated. Finally, students delivered brief "elevator pitches" as LCA administrators and teachers viewed their designs. Each final product was unique and the result of creative and critical thinking. Who knows, maybe LCA will someday feature an outdoor mini golf course, sand volleyball court, or art class extension!

Guilty or not guilty? That was the question 5th grade scientists attempted to answer this past spring as they reviewed evidence from a case of theft at a gem shop. This **CSI assignment** called on students to review all evidence and then bring their hypotheses to a group setting where they had to practice strong communication skills. Communication requires active sharing and listening. The 5th graders were very respectful and mature as they debated the facts of the case. Their attention to the details of science as well as to the art of communication impressed all who observed their work.
